


# SNA EARTHQUAKE RESPONSE - SITREP#10 for September 2023


The following report outlines the humanitarian response of Syrian NGO Alliance (SNA) members during Sep 2023, encompassing both the general response and post-earthquake response. the report focuses on three sectors: Education, Nutrition, and




### Education

- During Sep 2023 SNA members reported successful implementation of education programs in Idleb and Aleppo. the reporting members reached 6,982 new children(3,434 Boys, 3,548 Girls) across several age group and 84,675 repeated children (43,358 Boys, 41,317 Girls)
- The activites took place in 128 schools and 70 community
- The primary modality of the project activities was in-classroom providing Formal and Non-formal education
- The main recipients of these services were internally displaced person(IDPs)
  Accounting for 2,368 Ind and individuals from mixed background 4,614
- The kevel of education provided spanned from lower to upper secondary and primary levels included both formal and non-formal education and Early childhood care and education



















## **PROTECTION**

- SNA members responses are categorized under the areas of responsibilities (AoR) umbrella: Child protection, Protection, Gender-based violence (GBV), and Mine Action (MA).
- SNA members have reached a total of 88,133 beneficiaries through protection activites during Sep. the main beneficiaries include a combination of IDPs and host communities, when compared to July, there was a notable rise of 12.954 in the count of beneficiaries reached
- Support provided in response to the recent earthquake reached 62.603 beneficiaries (71.03% of the total reached). the main activites included awareness raising, distribution of dignity kit, providing psychosocial support, and offering in-kind materials assistance.
- In addition to activites targeting communities, members offered protection services in 23 collective shelters for displaced and homeless.





# 35 K Child protection 31 K




#### Total # of beneficiaries reached by age and gender

Total reached by sub-sector



## NUTRITION

- Interventions aimes to adress severe acute malnutrition (SAM) and moderate acute malnutrition (MAM) among boys and girls. the program reached an overall count of 261,642 beneficiaries, encompassing both follow-up cases and new recipients.
- Services were delivered at health facilities as well as via rapid response teams, focusing primarily on screening and referrals. family mid-upper arm circumference (MUAC) measurements, infant and yong child feeding (IYCF) practices, blanket supplementary feeding programme, micronutrients supplementation, community management of acute malnutrition (CMAM), and various nutrition-related activites were part of the programming.
- The project also provided support to pregnant and lactating women (PLW) to tackle MAM among them reffering those with MAM for further assistance. as a result, 14,587 pregnant women and 22,955 lactating women were reached through this intervention.
- progress was noted in recoveries, with 911 male and 2,240 female reported as having improved nutrition status.nonetheless, challenges were also encountered, including the unfortunate loss of 2 female and 3 male beneficiary and some cases where recipients didn't recover as anticipated or defaulted frome the program.
